- 2. What do Ardjin's interactions with his friends reveal about his social dynamics and their group hierarchy?
- 3. How does the author use the casual setting of Wings-N-Things to contrast with the emerging tension surrounding the debit card?

Summary: Ardjin wakes up hungover after a night of bowling and drinking, regretting his financial recklessness. His daydreams of a better life are interrupted by panic when he checks his bank balance, which remains unchanged despite his spending.

- 1. How do Ardjin's daydreams about a luxurious life with Ember/Amber reflect his deeper desires and insecurities?
- 2. What does Ardjin's compulsive checking of his bank balance suggest about his relationship with money and control?
- 3. How does the author use Ardjin's physical discomfort (hangover, vomiting) to parallel his growing unease about the card?

Summary: Ardjin's health begins to decline with nausea and headaches. He visits the bank, suspicious of the card, but the teller confirms his transactions and an unchanged balance, deepening his confusion and fear.

- 1. How does Ardjin's declining health foreshadow potential consequences of using the mysterious card?
- 2. What role does the bank teller's casual demeanor play in heightening the contrast between Ardjin's internal panic and the external world?
- 3. How does the author use Ardjin's physical symptoms to amplify the horror elements introduced by the card?

Summary: Arlo performs at The Misty Moon's open mic night, distancing himself from his Tillman Oil family name. Facing a heckling crowd, he struggles with a performance mishap, forgetting lyrics to a cover song. A mysterious red-haired girl with a red bird logo on her shirt sings along to his original song, offering a rare moment of validation amidst the crowd's mockery.

- 1. How does the description of the downtown shopping district (e.g., boutique shops, Bagelicious, Lollipop Lane) reflect Arlo's state of mind? Why might retail environments be significant for his creative thinking, as mentioned in the text?
- 2. The music store is described as unexpectedly large and overwhelming, almost surreal. How does this setting contribute to the chapter's tone? What might the comparison to Bed, Bath, and Beyond suggest about Arlo's experience?
- 3. Arlo personifies the guitar, saying he was "talking to her" and describing it in vivid, almost romantic terms. What does this suggest about his relationship with music? How might the guitar's unique features (grey wood, gothic tuning keys, red bird logo) hold symbolic or narrative significance?
- 4. The discovery of a music store in Silver Lake, previously unknown to Arlo, is surprising given his familiarity with the area. What might this suggest about changes in the town or Arlo's perception of it?

Summary: Ardjin navigates a day at work while distracted by a mysterious card in his wallet and his anticipation for a night out at Wings-N-Things. The chapter builds toward a climactic moment where Ardjin, despite his nervousness, attempts to speak to Ember, only to collapse.

- 3. Ardjin's approach to the girl is described as a battle, with "legions at war" inside him. How does this imagery highlight the theme of courage? How does his collapse complicate this theme?

- 2. In what ways does the mysterious debit card serve as a metaphor for modern financial systems or personal desires?
- 3. How does the author blend elements of quiet horror with everyday settings to create suspense in these chapters?
- 4. How do Ardjin's relationships with Ember, Arlo, Danny, and Chet influence his decisions regarding the card?
- 5. What role does the setting of Silver Lake, Oklahoma, play in grounding the supernatural elements of the story?
